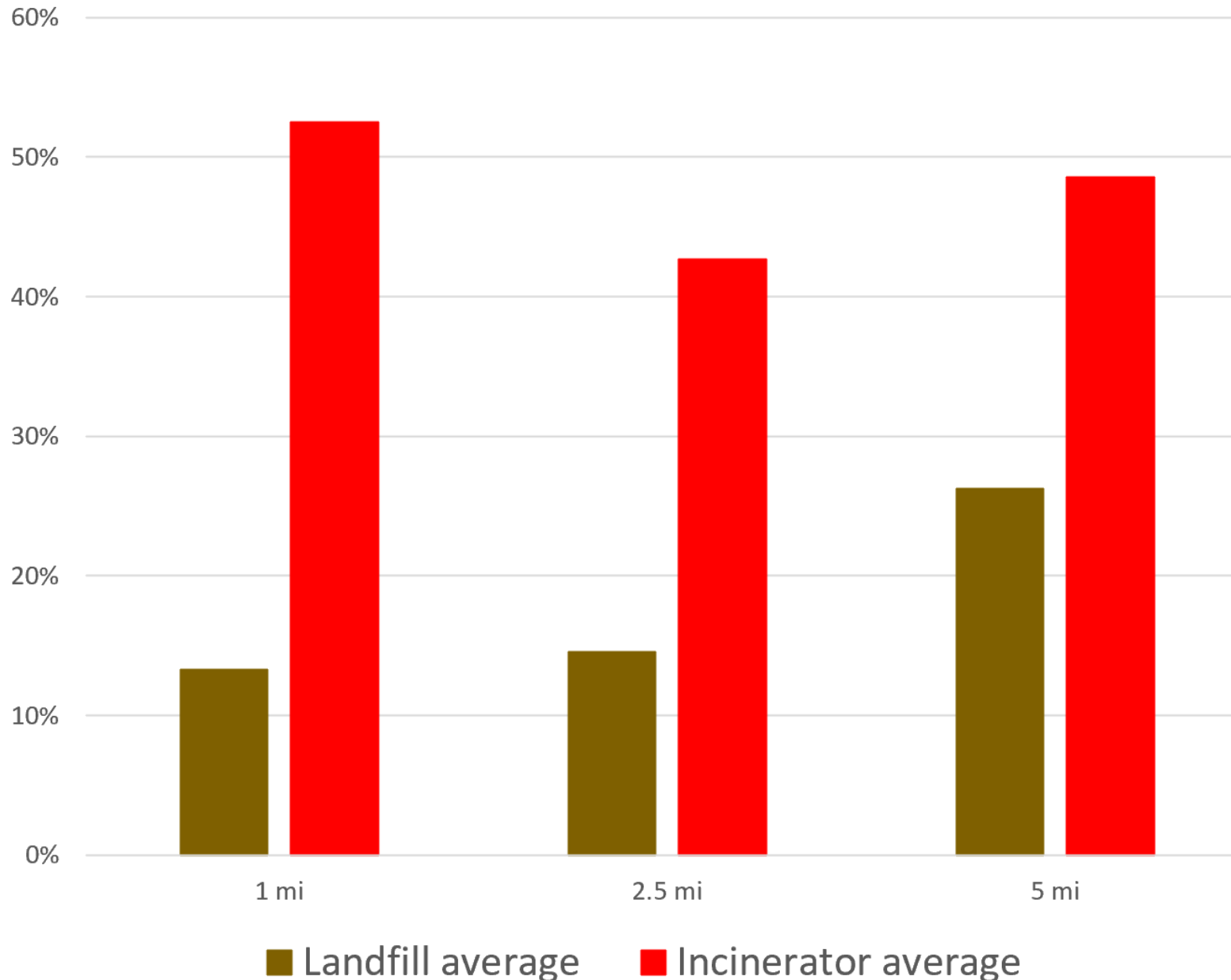

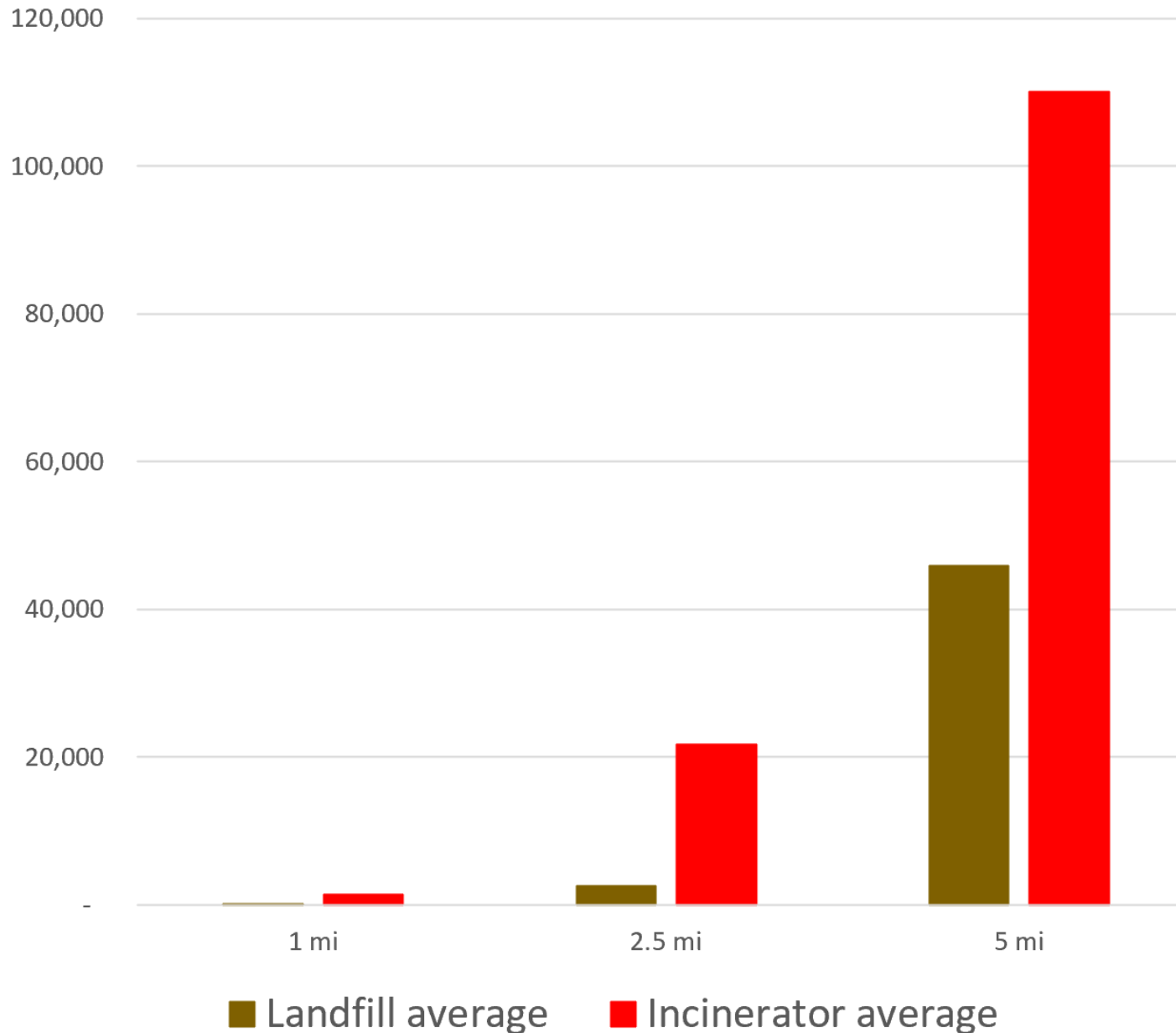


Median Household Income at Census tracts hosting Landfills & Incinerators Philly Uses

Incinerators impact far more people and far more low-income people and people of color.

Above are the top six municipal waste disposal facilities currently taking Philadelphia's trash, and the only ones likely to be bidding to take any meaningful percentage of the city's trash in the next contract.
